(2) Electronic Notarization



How did other states implement eNotarization?

- Adoption of Uniform Electronic Transactions Act (UETA) (1999)
 - Arkansas, Maryland, Texas, Utah, Vermont
- Adoption of Revised Uniform Law on Notarial Acts (RULONA)(2010)
 - Montana (admin. regs. pending)
- Combination of UETA & RULONA
 - lowa
- Combination of Legislation, Regulation, and Model Code
 - California, Colorado, Florida, Minnesota, New Mexico, North Carolina, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia



Considerations of Remote Notarization

Pros:

- Finding a Notary
 - Military & Overseas Transactions
 - "After Hours" Transactions
- Knowledge Based Authentication
- Digit Audit Trail
- Safety of Individuals & Notary Officers

Cons:

- Security of Personal Information
- Coercion



Potential Safeguards for Remote Notarization

- Limit the scope of the application and set forth requirements to assure the identity of the remote individual and the security of the communication.
- Authorize the Secretary of State or other commissioning officer or agency to adopt rules regarding the performance of the notarial act for a person located outside the United States.



<u>Uniform Law Commission Amendment to</u> <u>Notarial Acts Act</u>

- <u>Changes:</u> This authorizes notaries public to perform notarial acts in the state in which they are commissioned for individuals who are physically located outside the United States.
- Purpose: Communication technology and third-party identity proofing be utilized to allow individuals who are physically located outside the United States to communicate with, and be identified by, a notary public in a state adopting this amendment.
