

ISSUE BRIEFING: Honor Vote and Vote in Honor of a Veteran Programs

Summary

Honor Vote and Vote in Honor of a Veteran programs give voters the opportunity to recognize and express their appreciation for service members who are currently or have selflessly served to protect the United States and its citizens. Most of these programs are managed by Secretaries of State who serve as their state's Chief Election Official.

How the Program Works

Typically, participating states have an online form, where registered voters can share a written dedication to a veteran or active-duty service member of their choice. Oftentimes, the veterans are or were citizens of the state that offers the honor program. The form may ask the voter to include the veteran's full name, military branch, rank, and service dates, as well as the voter's full name and contact information. The voter may also be asked to share why they are dedicating their vote to the specified veteran/service member and to highlight any additional achievements and military decorations. Some forms also allow the voters to share photos of the veteran/service member.

Once the form has been submitted by the voter and reviewed by the program's host office, the tribute can be publicly viewed online. Most offices will send the voter small tokens for their dedication, such as buttons/pins, stickers, and/or other memorabilia to indicate their participation in the program. It is permissible for participating citizens to wear the buttons/pins at their voting location.

As a note, each state's program details may vary.
