HUMAN TRAFFICKING RED FLAGS

Health Sector

Know what to look for and how to report.



Potential Indicators

Victims lack the freedom to leave their work or living conditions; often escorted when they travel or kept under surveillance with their communications restricted or third party translator.

Victims may exhibit signs of abuse (bruises, cuts, burns, scars, prolonged lack of healthcare or malnourishment, poor hygiene, poor dental hygiene).

Victims may exhibit fear, anxiety, depression, nervousness, hostility, flashbacks, drug/alcohol addiction. Victims may also avoid eye contact.

Victims may not have control of their own money or identification documents (e.g., ID, DL, Passport, etc.). Victims may have little personal possessions.

Victims may have inconsistencies in their story. Responses seem scripted or rehearsed.

Victims may be "branded" with tattoos, clothing, or jewelry to indicate someone else's ownership.

Victims may not realize they are a victim and may not ask for help.

Victims can be any age, gender, nutionality, or race, and come from any socioeconomic class.



The State needs businesses to help stop human trafficking.

The Office of the WV Secretary of State is partnering with WV businesses to combat human trafficking. By partnering with state government in the "Businesses Against Trafficking" campaign, your business plays a crucial role in addressing the problem by prioritizing these three components:

- 1. Information for victims on how to seek help:
- 2. Information for businesses on how they can assist in the effort; and
- 3. Information for the public on recognizing signs of trafficking and reporting suspicious activity.

Businesses can support VICTIMS by providing access to information on what qualifies as human trafficking, how to report crimes, send signals for help, and offer resources to assist in recovery.

WVBAT enlists the assistance of BUSINESSES and business associations across the state to collaborate with law enforcement and become a venue for disseminating information to everyone who plays a role in combatting the problem.

WVBAT supports the statewide PUBLIC "You Con" initiative to address human trafficking. "You Can" provides West Virginians a local reporting line to report suspicious activity to appropriate local, state, and federal authorities.

Even the smallest tip could save a victim.
